

## DEGREE PROGRAMS

The Italian University system has recently changed to conform to the European standard. Most of the Degree Programs provide two kinds of diplomas as follows:

- An Undergraduate Degree named "Diploma di Laurea", awarded after 3 years of study and with the acquisition of 180 European (ECTS) credits;
- A Graduate Degree named "Diploma di Laurea Specialistica" awarded after 5 years of study (including the undergraduate degree), with the comprehensive acquisition of 300 credits.

### UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE

#### UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE IN LEGAL SERVICES FOR BUSINESS AND PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION – A09

This three-year program is geared toward students who do not plan to pursue a traditional legal profession. The program offers students an opportunity to choose between the two concentrations of Business and Public Administration jurist. All students begin their first year with courses aimed at providing essential legal and economic language and the conceptual foundations needed to study the subjects taught during the remaining two years of each specialization.

- **Business:** Students choosing to specialize in Business attend classes about company law, contract law, financial intermediaries and financial market law, banking and insurance law, industrial law, tax law, employment law, trade union and social security law, as well as economic courses on company structure (business economy/administration, financial intermediary economy) and additional classes required for the use of data processing systems as needed.
- **Public Administration:** Students choosing to pursue a career as a Public Administration jurists attend classes covering topics such as administrative (public administration) law, history of administrative (public administration) law, public administration science and administrative process, regional and local body law, environmental law, municipal law, cultural heritage law, public economy law, tax law, financial sciences, public accounting, basic information law, computer science, health, and of social security law.

## UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE IN LINGUISTIC AND CULTURAL MEDIATION – A 11

The three-year degree in Linguistic and Cultural Mediation prepares graduates with a high professional profile. They will be able to undertake and manage tasks in both the private and public sectors where linguistic competence in foreign languages and knowledge of their related country's culture is requested. Graduates will also be able to use intercultural communication tools.

The study of three foreign languages, their related cultures, and linguistic mediation techniques will be supplemented by an introduction to economic, juridical and social contexts. Teaching is geared toward rapid insertion in the working environment. Priority is given to acquiring practical competencies that promote a student's ability to undertake concrete professional tasks by communicating in areas and countries with different cultural background.

## GRADUATE DEGREE PROGRAMS

### GRADUATE DEGREE IN LAW – A07

The two-year Graduate degree in Law (120 ECTS) provides an advanced, in-depth knowledge for the critical analysis of legal norms. It furthermore develops the student's competence in technical and juridical reasoning and argumentation, in written and oral form. The program aims at preparing students for the legal professions, (lawyer, judge, notary public), high-level administrative positions in the civil service, private enterprises or university careers.

Within the degree program there are several options providing concrete possibilities of specialization. Each student, under the guidance of their professor, should include in their program of studies those subjects that are most closely connected with their concluding thesis.

Beyond this, graduates are expected to demonstrate informatics skills and a working knowledge of another European language.

## ADMINISTRATIVE LAW I

This course is designed to review the general discipline of Italian Administrative Law and the Administrative Justice as well. Concerning the first part the course will be focused on the following topics: the sources: generals, the theory of the sources, ruling instruments, interpretation. The public administration in the constitutional system: principles, the notion of public administration. Organization: public body, body and function, controls, the public body system, the privatisation process, the independent Administrations, employment relationship. Administrative activities: principles, the activity of the public administration, the administrative procedure, procedure-governing legislation, participation and right to access, legitimate interest, discretion and merit, acts and behaviours, measures, invalidity and defects, self protection. Conventional activity: contracts, conventions, agreements by the terms of art. 11 and 14 of Law n. 241/90. Public services: public services in general, the organization of public services: central, regional and local services, regulations. Public Administration responsibility.

Regarding the administrative justice, the following topics will be discussed: origins and development of the administrative justice system, sources, constitutional principles. Jurisdictional protection: subdivision of jurisdictions, powers and limits of the ordinary judge, proceedings, execution of judgement against the public administration, types of administrative proceedings. The administrative judgement: juridical nature and object, judgement of legitimacy, exclusive and merit jurisdiction. The inquiry. Cautionary safeguard. Compliance judgement. The appeal. Proceedings before Administrative Regional Courts and the Council of State. Special proceedings. Non jurisdictional protection.

This course covers the provisions set forth in the Finance Consolidated Act: “The Italian Law on Financial Intermediation”, Legislative Decree no. 58 of February 24, 1998, and namely: the law concerning companies issuing financial instruments traded on regulated Italian security markets; the law concerning intermediaries (investment companies, Undertakings for Collective Investment in Transferable Securities “UCITS”); the law of markets. Special emphasis on “corporate governance”, also in the light of the recent reform of unlisted companies in Italy. Students’ active participation is recommended since the course as well as exams are based on case studies. Lectures, interdisciplinary meetings and seminars are also organized in the frame of the course.

This course aims to provide students with a deeper knowledge and understanding of public law in certain European countries. Selected problems in the areas of equality and socio-economic rights are discussed using for purposes of comparison, legal material from Germany, France, England and United States. The course will also explore the problems surrounding the influence of European law on the legal order of member states. The last part of the course will focus on the decisions of the German Constitutional Court, exploring its shaping of a constitutional jurisprudence, particularly with regard to fundamental rights.

This course covers the following topics: Laws and regulations governing banking and financial activities: the historical evolution of the system; the bank and financial markets; companies operating in the banking field. Banking and para-banking contracts: generals; savings raising; lending; services. Rules and regulations governing banking contracts with reference to consumer protection: transparency of contract conditions by the terms of the Consolidation Act; illegal clauses in contracts with consumers (art. 1469 bis and subsequent articles of the Civil Code, as adopted by art. 25 of Law n. 52, February 6<sup>th</sup> 1996) and application thereof to banking contracts; consumer credit.

This course covers bio-ethic theories as an introduction to the following topics: clinical cases, the multifaceted problems inherent in the doctor-patient relationship and, more

generally, in health care. Specific topics: the right to health care, information to patients, the consensus to medical treatment, early guidelines, the right to privacy as regards personal health, recommended and practicable therapy, refusal of therapy, therapeutic obstinacy, care of incurable patients, euthanasia. Legal ruling of bioethical matters, possible models thereof, with reference to some matters already ruled in Italian or in other foreign legal systems or by supranational law. Topics include: artificial insemination, abortion, mapping of human genome, genetic tests, clinical experimentation, organ transplantation and medical doctors' professional liability.

Furthermore, particular attention is placed on the current organization of private law sources in the considered legal systems and on the phenomenon of circulation of legal models.

Macroeconomics: the circular flow of income; national income determination and the tax policy role; the Keynesian multiplier; money and money policy; the IS-LM model.

It is specifically designed to study the problems relating to the new form of the organization of the Republic in the light of the relationships between the State and regional (and local) bodies as resulting from the Constitutional reform. Topics include: Regional sovereignty between autonomy and federalism. Special autonomies, differentiated autonomies and ordinary autonomies. Regions, European Union and international relationships. The regional sources in the national legislative system. Statutes, laws and regulations. Regional law-making competence, its limits and relationships with State legislation. Forms and bodies of Regional government. Regional law-making power. Constitutional demarcation disputes. Regional administrative organization. Regional administrative competence and exercise thereof. Forms of co-operation between State, Regions and local bodies. State substituting powers. Demarcation disputes. Regional finance between autonomy and equality. Regional budgets and financial laws. Regional taxes and participation in State tax receipts.

This course is designed as an introduction to the Swiss civil law, and discusses its legislative sources, i.e. the Civil Code and the Code of Obligations. Therefore, this course is not intended as a detailed review of civil law; it is designed to recall the jus-political functions and the historical value of the fundamental institutes of the Swiss private law and to show the very close relationship between the civil law system and social organization. Hence, this course intends to present the Swiss private law as a strictly technical and apolitical product, rather as the result of specific social choices and social disputes which led to the development of the positive regulation, and justify its existence and enforcement. The course is designed to review the basic characteristics of the Swiss private law and its most important institutes; it includes two modules relating to the Civil Code and to the Code of Obligations, respectively.
